

## **Anonymising manuscripts**

### **Helsinki University Press**

All publications of Helsinki University Press undergo a double-blind peer review process before the Academic Board makes the publishing decision. Therefore, we kindly ask you to prepare two different copies of the manuscript for submission, preferably in Word format: one file with all your author details included, and another anonymised one. Submitting an anonymous manuscript is important to ensure an objective process, and to confirm that reviewers will not be able to identify you, your co-authors, or the institution where the research has been carried out.

Please note that the anonymised version of the manuscript is prepared solely for the purposes of anonymous peer review, and all details removed from the text for this purpose can be part of the final version of the manuscript.

#### *How to make your manuscript anonymous*

1. Please remove all mentions of author name(s) and institutional affiliation(s) from the Table of Contents of the manuscript and, in edited collections, from chapter title pages, and in-text citations, if there are references to the contributors of the volume.
2. Make sure not to mention any **grants, research projects, sources of funding, institutions or acknowledgements** in the anonymous version of the manuscript since they may reveal the identity of the author(s). These can naturally be provided in the non-anonymous version. If the manuscript includes a Foreword, which is written by someone close to the author(s), or is otherwise revealing, it should be removed from the anonymised version.
3. Do not add any **page headers or footers** that would identify you.
4. **Avoid, or try to minimise, any self-citation.** If you have cited your own work, make sure that you have referred to **your own references in the third person**, e.g. write “Smith and Black (2007) have demonstrated”, not “We have previously demonstrated (Smith & Black, 2007)”. In the same way, phrasing like “Elsewhere I have argued....” should be changed as above, as they are followed by the source “Smith & Black have argued.... (Smith & Black, 2007)”.
5. If you are unable to avoid referring to self-cited work in the first person, then **delete the author names, or other identifying information (such as your institution) and replace it with [Author(s)] in the text.** In the case of multiple authors, create a series as appropriate ([Author A], [Author B] and so on). In the reference list, delete the citation, and use a placeholder “Author Citation” with the date of publication (e.g. [Author Citation. (2010)]). These citations should appear at the beginning of the reference list.
6. **Search through the whole manuscript** by the author’s name (in edited collections, all authors’ names) and check all instances where it is mentioned, in order to ensure that there are no details which may reveal the identity of the author(s), such as image credits, social-media accounts, etc.
